Problem

The MA sex ed curriculum has not been updated since 1999. Students are receiving out-of-date and sometimes blatantly incorrect information that prioritizes abstinence above all else.

Solution

A comprehensive, ageappropriate, and medically accurate sex-ed curriculum that includes preventing STIs and promoting healthy relationships and consent. "The emphasis of this bill on consent, what healthy relationships look like, and being LGBTQ-inclusive [would have an incredible impact]. If we get [students] before misinformation gets them, or before stigma and social isolation get to them, then they're going to have a lot healthier trajectory overall, over their whole life course."
